- Some highlights of 2016/2017
 - Much progress on the application, including two major releases and four minor
 - New Public User Interface
 - Starter OAI-PMH responder
 - Enhanced rights management
 - Remediated some issues with reports more to come
 - Updated underlying technologies and paid down significant technical debt

 - Aim is to helps you in planning for upgrades as well give you a sense of opportunities to participate and contribute

- Helped more people learn to use the application, and help each other

 - A new one-day introductory training offering
 - Along with our standard workshops, 11 training sessions provided to over 250 participants from more than two dozen institutions, from Boston to Evanston to Hong Kong

 - Making ArchivesSpace easier to install and maintain
 - Finally getting reports where they need to be
 - Updating the AT and Archon migration tools
 - Revamping the Agents module for fuller EAC-CPF and MARC authority support as well as synchronization with external databases
