



A Few Questions

How can we continually work to create archival description that is more accurate and more respectful to all of our users? How might we grapple with and address forms of discrimination, not just in our "archival work," but in the structures of our workplaces themselves?

ALA Draft Resolution: "Greater Transparency in the Library of **Congress Subject Headings Revision Process**"

"For newly emerging topics and disciplines, it is not always easy to find consensus among authorities as to what term should be used for the topic. Generally, prefer current American usage for a concept. In cases where there is no consensus among American authorities, SHM H 187 instructs catalogers to make an intuitive judgment based on available evidence...It is important to remember that sources consulted must be relevant to the topic being established." [emphasis mine]


The Learning and Working Group on Metadata Justice - Charter

Scope

The Learning and Working Group on Metadata Justice (Metadata Justice) and its mission are informed by a growing recognition in the LIS field that "library neutrality" is an antiquated notion. Power structures in our society still favor certain groups over others. To paraphrase Elie Wiesel, neutrality is not neutral; it always favors the oppressor. We therefore must challenge library neutrality if we wish to dismantle our profession's inherent systems of injustice, such as (but not limited to) the whiteness of libraries and the widespread linguistic biases of our metadata. Metadata Justice has a twofold mission: (1) working on specific projects that bring about progressive change in metadata conventions and naming practices, especially as they relate to social justice for people and groups in Oklahoma and the American Southwest, and (2) educating ourselves, our colleagues, and our fellow LIS professionals about emerging debates and developments in metadata justice, critical librarianship, and related subjects.

- Identifying and correcting the absence of Library of Congress Subject Headings
- Readings and discussions on relevant and useful topics
- Presentations and other outreach activities to other campus, local, and national groups
