


Getting Started: ArchivesSpace Application

ArchivesSpace is an application, but it's also a member-driven community and program. Here are some **key resources to get started with using the application**. Our website, <http://archivespace.org>, is a great place to start for general information.

Get started with using the application:

	Download the ArchivesSpace application: The application is free to download and use: https://github.com/archivespace/archivespace/releases/latest
	Migration tools & data mappings: Migration resources are provided freely to all in the ArchivesSpace community: http://archivespace.org/using-archivespace/migration-tools-and-data-mapping For those who are ArchivesSpace members, the Migration sub-team of our Technical Advisory Council can provide additional guidance in planning for moving data from other systems into ArchivesSpace.
	Trainings & workshops: ArchivesSpace offers face-to-face and online training and consultations to members and non-members: http://archivespace.org/using-archivespace/trainings
	ArchivesSpace Help Center: The ArchivesSpace Help Center is a benefit of ArchivesSpace membership. The Help Center includes access to the user manual as well as video tutorials.






Participate in community programs:

	Development: Development is driven by member participation. A cross-council Development Prioritization subteam prioritizes the feature requests and bug fixes in the development catalog to determine what to address soonest.
	Development catalog (JIRA tickets): The ArchivesSpace development catalog is public and contains information on all issues identified throughout the course of the program and indications of their status. Anyone can sign up for an account to submit, comment on or follow issues: http://development.archivespace.org
	Github & plugins: Because ArchivesSpace is open source, anyone can develop for it, for themselves or for the overall community. So regardless of what's being worked on as part of the program's prioritization and development processes, community members may develop or contract for development on features of particular interest to them at any point. This might mean building a simple plugin to change something relatively small, or working in the core code to extend or change the ways certain functionality operates. Get to know the ArchivesSpace community:

	Community governance: There are three member governance groups: the Governance Board, the User Advisory Council, and the Technical Advisory Council. The ArchivesSpace governance model is designed to provide opportunities for all levels of membership to participate in and provide guidance for the development of the ArchivesSpace application over time.

	Open community calls: We host a quarterly open community call on Zoom. An open call is an opportunity to surface news, ideas, and challenges and encourage group discussion with your peers. You may join the call by phone or computer.
	Annual Member Forum: ArchivesSpace hosts an annual Member Forum during the week of the Society of American Archivists annual conference. The Annual Forum is an opportunity for all of our members to come together face-to-face to learn, discuss, and connect with others around anything related to ArchivesSpace.
	Regional Forums: ArchivesSpace partners with institutions to host forums for local and neighboring institutions. Regional forums are opportunities for our diverse ArchivesSpace members to meet up more locally to share and learn from each other through workshops, focused discussion sessions, and presentations.
